The Summary

Many species of insects, birds and wildlife are rapidly declining. Without these, the whole ecosystem is under threat. Simple actions can make a huge difference.

Ecosystems exist for a reason – a thriving ecosystem needs variety. As big players at the bottom of the food chain, insects are crucial to a thriving eco-system, yet their numbers are in serious decline, along with many other species.

Wildlife needs two major things to thrive: a good food source and shelter.



Did you know...

that we have at least 5 barn owls nesting in Yatton? Why? Because humans have kindly put up nest boxes to give them a home.

Triple whammy actions (multiple benefits)

- Plant a fruit tree. Provides shelter, pollination sites, and food sources for wildlife all at once.
- Let Slugs/Snails/Insects be. Don't use slug pellets and chemical pesticides. They not only kill slugs and insects but also the many birds, bats, hedgehogs etc. which eat them!
- Create a herb garden. Benefits insects (and therefore birds) and butterflies;
 also edible and has zero food miles and no carbon emissions to get to your plate!

 Talk to others. Show them this information and encourage them to join your efforts we're all in this together.

Do Some Good

(easy/achievable actions)

- ReWild: leave a rough 'margin' or patch in your garden. Leave part of the lawn to grow like a wild meadow - this will encourage insects, shelter for small mammals
- Provide shelter by making mini-habitats build little log or stone piles where insects and small creatures can shelter.
- Provide water; create a bird bath -- can be as simple as an upturned bin lid. No deeper than 10cm deep, and no fish. Provides drinks/baths for birds, and habitat for toads, frogs, newts and insects. Ideally in a sheltered site.
- Join YACWAG, Yatton and Congresbury Wildlife Action Group and get involved in their activities. See www.yacwag.org.uk
- Support the Agriculture Bill. RSPB and WWF (World Wide Fund for Nature)
 are asking us to write to MPs to get them to support the Agriculture Bill to
 use legislation to protect both farmers and nature.

Build Toward Sustainability (put in the effort)

- Create shelters: put up a bird/owl box, create areas of the garden especially for insects and birds, plant shrubs, create a birdbath etc.
- Make your garden wildlife friendly.

 Create Hedgehog highways. Hedgehogs like to travel across a wide territory. Talk to your neighbours about encouraging hedgehogs -put gaps in the garden border/fences so they can get from garden to garden... so long as there aren't slug pellets!

Plant hedgerows next to (or replacing) a fence.
 Hawthorn and Pyracantha are great as they provide nesting sites but are also a thorny deterrent to burglars!

 Plan now to plant things this spring that will attract insects and support caterpillars and larvae. Lots of advice here:

- Unpave tear up the concrete; get back to soil and grass wherever possible.

 Buy more local produce.




Did you know....

Game Changers (to shift thinking and social structures)

- **Encourage neighbours** (esp in new housing developments) to do actions above to Do Some Good if even 25% of people do these, it will make a huge difference.
- Green Open Homes and Garden Open Days show others how to make
 their spaces more environmentally friendly by example invite us in and
 show us around, give tips etc. MYG will be happy to circulate details for
 you or put you in touch with organisers of these events.
- Start a plant sharing/information scheme to encourage more people to plant insect/bird/wildlife friendly plants.
- Research food production using local land how can we use local land for food production for the local community? We need good links with the farming community - how do we build these?
- Coordinate with others to start a local food market under the Country Markets www.country-markets.co.uk - Sue Simmons is a local contact.
- Lobby government or write to your MP. Check out the strategies and information at the WWF, RSPB and World Resources Institute (WRI). Join their campaigns and platforms.
- Get to know **Gold Standard** www.goldstandard.org and start a project that leads toward Zero Carbon.
- Research a local wildlife issue and make recommendations next year for further action to be taken by the council or individuals in the community.

The latest UK State of Nature Report (2019)

This summary of the State of Nature Report (2019)

(www.nationaltrust.org.uk/features/state-of-nature-2019-uks-wildlife-loss-continues-unabated) states that since 1970 (and most rapidly recently):

- 15 per cent of species under threat of extinction and 2 per cent of species have already gone for good.
- Average abundance of wildlife has fallen by 13 per cent with the steepest losses in the last ten years.
- 41 per cent of UK species studied have fallen and 133 species have already been lost from our shores.
- Butterflies and moths, down 17 per cent and 25 per cent respectively.
 Numbers of high brown fritillary and grayling butterflies, have fallen by more than three quarters.
- The average amount of mammals has fallen by 26 per cent and the wild cat and greater mouse-eared bat are almost extinct.
