In the News


Covid 19












The new COVID-19 variant (known as Delta) spreads more easily than the other variants that were previously most common. To help stop the spread, you should:











- [Get both doses of the vaccine](#) when you are offered it, and encourage others to do so as well
- Participate in surge testing in your local area, whether you are vaccinated or not
- [Self-isolate](#) immediately if you have any [symptoms](#) of COVID-19 (a high temperature, a new, continuous cough or a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste) or if you've tested [positive](#) for COVID-19

In the areas listed above, you should also take particular caution when meeting anyone outside your household or support bubble. Wherever possible, you should try to:

- Meet outside rather than inside where possible
- Keep 2 meters apart from people that you do not live with (unless you have formed a support bubble with them), this includes friends and family you don't live with
- Minimise travel in and out of affected areas

Chiefs News

Mr Marsh began his policing career with the force in 1987, and has been chief since 2016.

As he prepared to leave the post, he paid tribute to his officers and highlighted the dangers of the role.

Mr Marsh spoke out about going on patrol with two female police officers who had both been at [the riots outside Bridewell Police Station](#) in March: "One of them had a container of urine thrown over her and was assaulted. Another one had her helmet smashed by a bottle thrown. Now to smash a public order helmet takes an awful lot. She was pushed under a police horse, incredibly traumatised - and these are real people.



"I feel I've seen the worst of this pandemic through and I'm incredibly proud of how police officers that I'm privileged to serve with, and police staff, have managed the Black Lives Matter protest, the Kill The Bill protest and the policing of Covid."

Iain Prideaux, Chair of Avon and Somerset Police Federation, said: "I have had the pleasure of serving under Mr Marsh's leadership and he has brought benefits both internally and externally. The introduction of body worn cameras has brought transparency and a greater understanding of the challenges police officers face and Mr Marsh has promoted kindness in leadership and officer wellbeing.

"Mr Marsh introduced the 7-point promise to look after staff who are assaulted or a victim of hate crime and welfare information forms which keep him sighted on incidents when officers have been hurt. I wish to thank him for setting an example of what vocational service looks like - and congratulations on your retirement."

Mini Police

Mini Police

We are so pleased to say that we will be starting another Mini Police group at Yatton Junior School in September 2021, this is dependent on Covid restrictions. We were unable to finish with our last group in 2020, we are hopeful that this next school year will be a success.

The Mini Police initiative – jointly funded by Avon and Somerset Police, Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner, and National Volunteer Police Cadets – is delivered by members of the local Neighbourhood Policing team in partnership with schools.

It offers children aged between 9 and 11 years old the chance to build positive relationships with their local police team, whilst helping out in their school and the wider community. The sessions are held in school and will also support curriculum based activities working towards Duke of Cornwall award.

Children learn what it means to be a police officer and the importance of the community working with police to help protect them from crime. By engaging with children and young people from an early age, the Mini Police aims to reduce future demand, discussing how getting involved in criminality can affect their lives and planting the seed that policing could be a career for them in the future.

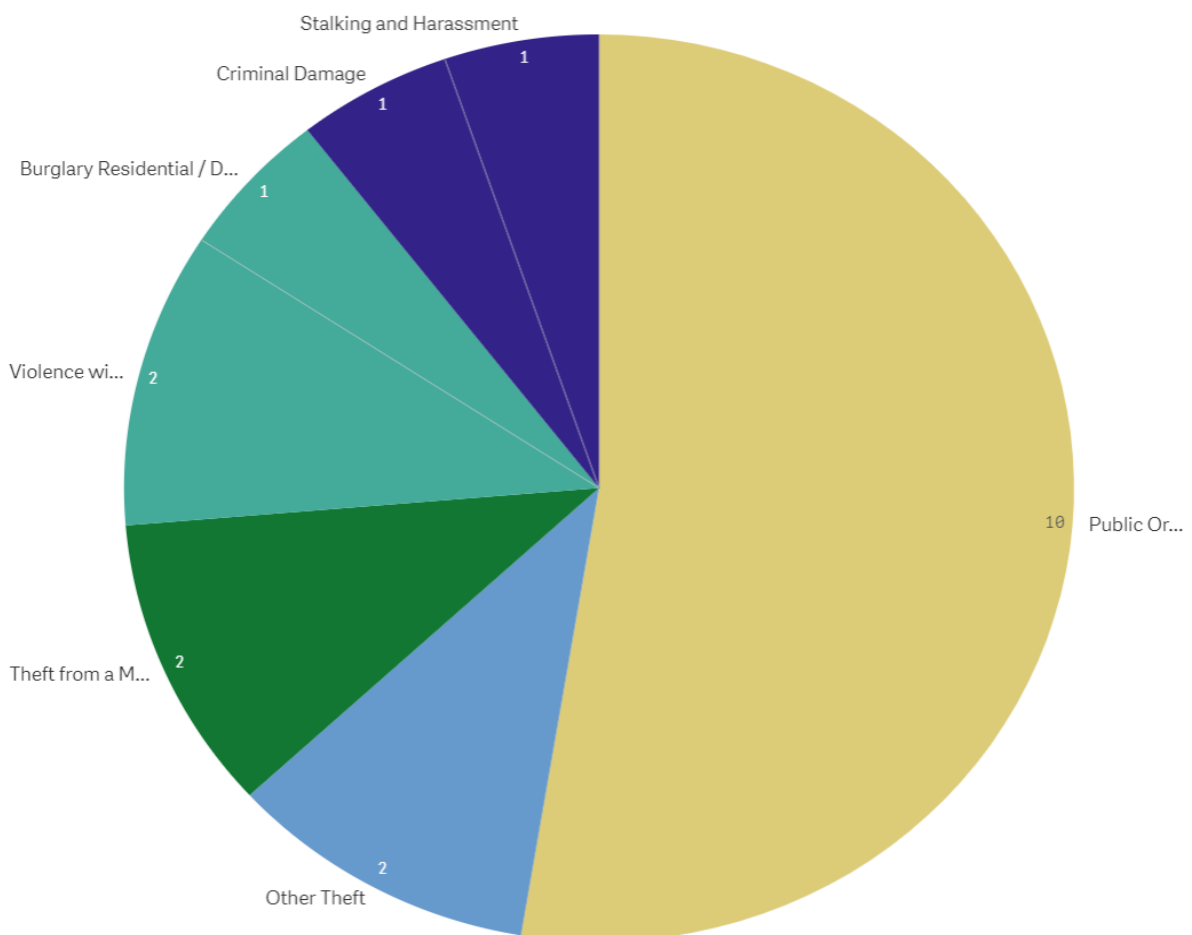
The children have applied for their positions and we will be holding interviews next week.
